Dear Parents and Guardians,

I hope that rest and relaxation are on the docket for these summer months and that you and your sons find some relief and respite from the hectic pace of the academic year. Life on Eye Street is as vibrant as ever. Summer service trips, the alumni Father-Son Irish Trip, the Summer Learning Program and summer athletic camps are either already complete or in full swing. We are eagerly awaiting and preparing for the return of students in August and for our newest students, freshmen and transfers alike, to officially join us.

Next academic year promises to be a busy and exciting one at Gonzaga. As a faculty and staff, we'll be tackling some issues that have arisen over the past few years. First, we all want to improve classroom attendance. Students already miss class for important Gonzaga activities such as retreats, service, field trips and athletics. Couple that with the number of times an average teenager is sick each year and one reaches the ten-absence mark fairly quickly. We need the cooperation of parents in making sure their sons are in school, when healthy, each and every school day. For whatever reason, we have seen a more cavalier approach to absences in the past few years. We wish to foster the awareness that attendance is important for issues beyond mere mastery of content or any grade, that presence in class is also a gift to other students, and that we learn best as a community.

We'll also be taking a critical look at "grading" at Gonzaga. Asking ourselves such questions as: Do our tests and quizzes measure what we intend them to measure? Are we using sufficient formative assessments throughout the curriculum as opposed to purely summative assessments? Are our grades reflective of what our students learn or are we merely reporting how well they can perform on tests?

Lastly, we'll be discussing how to better facilitate the academic schedule during AP exam weeks. In a testament to the hard work of all of our teachers in preparing our students for the next level, we have seen a 33% rise in AP participation in the last 8 years. Now, just about 50% of all students take at least one AP course. Because of that, we may be reaching the tipping point where running the standard schedule during AP weeks is impractical.

Gonzaga, like any good institution, is a work in progress. Through the models of discernment and reflection provided us by St. Ignatius, Gonzaga will always be a place full of *contemplatives in action*. We invite you to share in our communal discernment as we best decide how to address these and other important issues.

As always, in the pages that follow you will find critical information from many offices around the school.

I look forward to another wonderful year!

Students, parents, and guardians are required to acknowledge that they have read the *Gonzaga Student-Parent Handbook*. **The acknowledgement form for parents and guardians will be completed via Gonzaga's new website and should be done by August 11, 2017.** You will receive an email during the summer explaining how to log into the new website and that the acknowledgement form is ready for use. Students will sign an acknowledgement form in their homerooms at the conclusion of the first week of school. Please spend time this summer reading and familiarizing yourself and your son with the *Gonzaga Student-Parent Handbook*, which is also available on Gonzaga's website under Campus Life.

For returning students, class schedules can be found on NetCommunity beginning on June 19, 2017. Incoming students will be able to access class schedules when Gonzaga's new website launches on July 18, 2017. Instructions on how to log into the new website and access schedules will be provided later this summer.

This newsletter contains a detailed listing of upcoming events and dates. Please note that student orientation begins Tuesday, August 22, and classes begin Thursday, August 24. Detailed orientation schedules will be emailed to families prior to the start of school. Normal school dress code (collared shirt, dress pants, shoes, socks, and belt) will be in effect during the orientation days. For more complete listings of activities and events around school, please regularly consult the calendar posted on the school website. Beginning in August, athletic and other event schedules are updated on a weekly basis.

A Note from the Admissions Office for New Students:

The Gonzaga community eagerly anticipates our new students joining us in the fall! As per the acceptance letter received by each student, registration is not complete until Gonzaga receives your son's final official transcript from his previous school. Parents should make this request directly to the previous school. The school then should send the transcript directly to the Office of Admissions at Gonzaga. A Transcript Request Form was in each acceptance packet, but if you need a new form, or if you have questions, please contact the Dean of Admissions and Financial Aid, Mr. Andrew Battaile, at (202) 336-7101 or abattaile@gonzaga.org.

Academics

Check your son's class schedule. If any student has questions or concerns, he can contact Mr. Michael Howell, the Academic Dean at (202) 336-7166. Please do so before the end of July.

Summer reading tests this year will be administered in each respective class during the first week of school. Students should have their reading complete before classes begin. Reading lists and study guides are available on the school website. Please be alert to the importance of these tests in getting the year off to a good start. Academic deficiencies in the first quarter can sometimes be linked to failing grades on the summer reading.

You can purchase your textbooks online from efollett.com, our textbook vendor again this year. Textbooks will become available on July 20, 2017. Simply follow the link on Gonzaga's website or point your browser to www.efollett.com and follow the links to the Gonzaga section. The whole process takes 15 to 20 minutes, and you will need a major credit card. Do not wait until school has started to obtain your books; order them early and come to school prepared. A few texts and workbooks are published by Gonzaga and may be purchased through the Gonzaga Bookstore. Please note that the school store maintains limited hours during the summer. Gonzaga Poets & Writers

Gonzaga Poets & Writers finished last school year with several activities. A group of nine Gonzaga poets went to Malcolm X Elementary School in Washington, D.C. to conduct a poetry workshop for a fifth grade class. They had a great time and the fifth graders did too. You can read an article about it

in the last issue of The Aquillian. The annual Senior Slam was held on May 11 and 20 seniors read their poetry and "signed the banner" in Kohlmann Hall, Room 22, as poets before them have done. Two Gonzaga seniors were honored at our Charter Day celebration by winning the Gerard Manley Hopkins, SJ Poetry Award: Deion Williams and Jirhe Love. These two poets wrote strong work all year.

When we come back to school in August, Gonzaga Poets & Writers will continue to meet every Thursday at 3pm. They discuss poetry, review their own work, and plan poetry events for the school. All are welcome to the meetings!

Campus Ministry

Attention parents of all *seniors*: To graduate, each senior is required to complete 20 hours of community service during the summer following his junior year and then twenty more during his senior academic year. Your son has already received a summer service packet explaining how the hours can be acquired and a listing of some local service sites in the metropolitan area. This service should be offered in support of the poor and/or marginalized (i.e. elderly, sick or hospitalized, disabled, or homebound). It is the student's responsibility to make the contact with the service sites in order to set up a volunteer schedule. Students who have questions concerning their summer service requirement should consult the Class of 2018 Canvas page and open the link for Summer Service Requirements. This link furnishes all related materials necessary before beginning any service. These are essential to finding acceptable service sites, and that will guide each senior as they prepare to complete their summer reflection essays.

At the start of next year, seniors who have not made a Kairos retreat are encouraged to sign up for the first fall retreat that will be offered Tuesday, October 24 to Friday, October 27. Applications are due well in advance of the retreat and will be made available to seniors in August. Several new initiatives will be offered to Kairos alumni, seniors and juniors, with the hope of helping this group bring the retreat home. News of these initiatives will be available in the fall. Juniors, when they receive the school calendar, should begin to evaluate when in the year is most suited to their making the Kairos retreat by considering their course work, team schedules, and other extracurricular commitments. Sophomores will make their retreat in the fall according to a schedule organized by homeroom; this schedule is also posted on the Campus Ministry Retreat site.

Our annual freshman retreat will be held over the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday weekend in January. The freshmen arrive on campus by noon on Friday, January 12, and retreat activities continue through mid-day on Sunday, January 14. This retreat is designed for the entire freshman class and is a mandatory part of Gonzaga's curriculum. Parents of freshmen, please mark your calendars now to avoid a scheduling conflict.

Campus Ministry and the Modern and Classic Languages Department aim to make available the Camino de Santiago independent tutorial to interested students for a third year. The course will meet twice a week before school during the second semester, include making 100 kilometers of the pilgrimage in Spain over spring break, and culminate in a small course project bringing the fruits of the trip back to Eye Street. Students learn about the history of this pilgrimage, make their own, and have a rich encounter with Ignatian spirituality. The approximate cost is \$2000.
